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2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Under the CBCS system, students are mentored by a nominated teacher supported by a guest faculty in all teaching departments. Tutorial groups are formed for closer interaction to bridge the academic gaps students experience due to their diverse socio-economic backgrounds. Under the continuous assessment, students are provided with multiple opportunities. The mentor helps the students address their problems and support them in academic activities by making necessary interventions. Students are mentored for their academic performance within the department and are encouraged to participate in various academic and cultural activities outside the department. Regular meetings are held between mentor and mentee. Students are allowed to approach the mentor for both academic and personal problems. Personalized professional /career advice is given. Mentors also guide in creating awareness on policies of the Department and routine procedures. As a part of the University's social inclusion initiative at the university level, the SC/ST cell of the University conducts a unique coaching program for SC/ST students appearing for SLET/NET and other competitive exams.

University has constructed seven check dams for rainwater harvesting in the year 2000-2005. This initiative has helped in improving the microclimate, groundwater recharge and biodiversity. The forest has significantly helped in carbon sequestration and acts as one of the major lung space of the city.
