BRIEF HISTORY OF DEPARTMENT

The Department was established in 1962 in Central College as a graduate department of the University of Mysore. In July 1964, with the establishment of Bangalore University, then center of Economics came under the jurisdiction of the new University as Department of Economics. A three years Economics (Honors) course was introduced in 1967 with the aid of the Danforth Foundation, USA. The course was modelled on the American pattern, headed by Dr. Quincy Adams. The M.A Economics course was introduced in 1969 in the Central College Campus. In 1976, the Department was shifted to the Manavika Bhavana in the Jnanabharathi Campus of the University.




THE EVOLVING LANDSCAPE

Critical concerns emerge from the dwindling standards of teaching and examination, perpetuated by outdated educational technology. Graduates and post-graduates, upon entering the workforce, aren't just confronted with unemployment but face the harsh reality of being perceived as unemployable. Furthermore, the diverse learning needs of students, spanning socio-economic disparities, disabilities, behavioural nuances, and speech and language challenges, are inadequately catered to.

REVITALIZING AND REFORMING THE TEACHING-LEARNING DOMAIN

Revamping the curriculum emerges as a cornerstone in this landscape. Introducing semester systems and revising syllabi pave the way for a progressive educational journey. Equally significant is the preparation of teachers, equipping them with the tools for effective instructional design. Orienting educators encompasses a broad spectrum namely:

- Formulation of a course objective.
- Designing learning activities.
- Designing classroom policies and procedures.
- Designing classroom communication structures.
- Effective methods of teaching.
- Question paper construction.
- Preparing assignment topics.
- Learning evaluation methodologies.

EMPOWERING THE LEARNERS

Empowering students is the linchpin of a reinvigorated system. Embedding a competencybased educational structure centred around the 7C's namely as envisaged by Gráinne Conole (2015),

- 1. Conceptualise
- 2. Create
- 3. Communicate
- 4. Collaborate
- 5. Consider
- 6.Combine
- 7. Consolidate

The educational structure should be centred around the 7Cs and collecting, analysing, and organizing information; effective communication; activity planning; teamwork; problem-solving; technological adeptness; and mathematical applications – becomes imperative. Simultaneously, students need orientation in a wide array of communication, behavioural, analytical, and social skills to thrive in the evolving world.

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Some broad principles of teaching Economics:

- Teachers can Provide an overview of the course.
- Ex: Theory of product pricing in Micro Economics.
- Dx = f (Px,.....): Captures consumer's behaviour.
- Sx = h (Px,.....): Captures producer's behaviour.
- Dx = Sx : Market equilibrium.
- Convey your higher order expectations.

Give scientific or theoretical content to student's practical experiences or general observations:

- Quiz the students on the following:
 - What is the nature of the relationship between Px and Dx?
 - When the D.C. touches Q-axis (X-axis), what can you say about the nature of the commodity?
 - When D.C touches P axis (Y axis), What is the quantity of X demanded by the consumer?
 - When D.C enters IV Quadrant, what can you say about the price?
 - Lead them from what is known to what is unknown.
 - Sense of Pride and sense of satisfaction to both the parties.

Draw out inherent creative powers of students:

Ex: Indifference curves are convex to the origin. But, Quiz:

> Why not concave? A straight – line? Parallel to Y – Axis? Parallel to X – axis? Proof by contradicting methodology.

Develop analytical capacity of students:

• Display the following tables on returns to scale:

TERRAIN UNDER SHADOW: TEACHING SOCIAL SCIENCES AT H.E.I

INTRODUCTION

The "World Social Science Report (WSSR)" recently released by the International Social Science Council offers a comprehensive overview of the global landscape of social sciences. Professor Gudmund Hernes, the Council's President, highlights the unprecedented influence of social sciences on various aspects of society. Notably, the report points to the increasing integration of social scientists into key decision-making roles, from boardrooms. While the report ministries to emphasizes the growing significance of social sciences, it also sheds light on the existing disparities and irregularities in the internationalization of these disciplines. One striking observation is the limited representation of Indian contributions, reflecting the hierarchical perception of knowledge disciplines in India. This mirrors the broader cultural hierarchy present in Indian society, where certain sciences are perceived as superior. This essay delves into the critical examination of the status of social science teaching in higher education institutions in India. The hierarchical structure of knowledge disciplines, reminiscent of the caste system, influences the perception and positioning of social sciences. The essay aims to scrutinize prevalent teaching methods and practices within social science education, offering insights for potential reforms. While acknowledging exceptional institutions, the focus remains on addressing widespread practices that have persisted for a century.

HISTORY AND SPREAD

Indian social sciences have deep roots in the country's culture and civilization, dating back to ancient texts like the Mahabharata and Kautilya's Arthashastra. During this period, social sciences encompassed a broad spectrum of knowledge, converging into the administrative art of running the state. The religious undercurrents of the time influenced social sciences, with a strong connection between knowledge and the welfare as perceived by rulers.

Throughout history, social sciences evolved within the framework of religious thinking, shaping the administrative systems of various dynasties such as the Mouryas, Chalukyas, and Hindu kings of Delhi. The articulation of social structure intertwined with economic organization reflected the religious ideologies of the time. Analytical scrutiny of these ideas was limited due to their religious foundation and authoritative origin. The transformative phase in the spread of social sciences in India occurred with British rule. The British introduced a Western perspective, challenging the earlier monolithic structure of social sciences. This shift embraced the divisibility of social sciences as defined by Western thinkers, marking a departure from the previous unified conceptualization. The British systematically integrated Western ideas into the Indian education system, notably through the Macaulay Committee's recommendations, which received approval from William Bentinck. The Macaulay report was a pivotal moment, advocating the adoption of English as the medium of learning and rejecting the significance of Sanskrit and Arabic literature. Macaulay critiqued the traditional literature as fostering errors and deemed the associated expenses wasteful.

This decision paved the way for the widespread acceptance of Western knowledge, methodologies, and teaching practices in India. The British education system, with its English-centric approach, became the dominant influence on Indian academics. This transition was not inherently flawed, as it had the potential to complement existing knowledge. However, the complete abandonment of indigenous thinking was unnecessary. Dr. Maulana Azad emphasized the transformative power of a truly liberal and humanitarian education, highlighting the potential to propel progress and prosperity. Despite Azad's vision, India chose to follow the British system, inadvertently sidelining the humanitarian aspect of teaching social sciences. The adoption of Western methodologies became a circumvented path, deviating from the indigenous humanitarian angle. This shift, dictated by policy and practice, marked a departure from the cultural and historical roots of Indian social sciences. The historical trajectory reflects a complex interplay between indigenous knowledge and the imposition of Western perspectives, shaping the contours of social sciences in India.

PROLIFERATION AND DIVISIBILITY

The inception of social sciences in India closely mirrored Western models, with economics, political science, sociology, geography, law, and education forming the foundational disciplines. Early academics, often trained in Western universities, replicated the entire Western system in Indian institutions during the first phase. This approach persisted through the second phase as these educators passed on the Western-influenced methods to subsequent generations without significant alterations. The third phase witnessed the introduction of Western books, teaching materials, and translated content, leading to an uncritical adoption of Western formats in disciplines like economics and sociology. Concepts like the "Indifference Curve" were taught without relevance to the Indian context, and sociological discussions were primarily based on Western perspectives.

This phase marked the proliferation of social sciences, resulting in 2382 schools, departments, and centers across India, although the distribution was uneven.

The expansion of universities and colleges in India, from 25 universities in 1956 to 431 by 2008, accompanied by a surge in enrollment to 11.6 million students, defined the growth trajectory. However, the proliferation disproportionately favored non-social science institutions, reflecting a societal hierarchy that mirrored the caste system. Social sciences occupied a perceived lower status, with admissions often considered only if other options were unavailable.

The fourth phase, characterized by neoliberal policy changes, witnessed the commercialization of education. Market forces dominated, emphasizing the marketability of graduates over the pursuit of knowledge. This shift led to the emergence of private universities, with 311 in the private sector compared to 345 public universities. Employability became the focal point, with placement cells gaining prominence. The emphasis on securing employment overshadowed the pursuit of knowledge, impacting the quality of teaching. The rise of 'education barons' marked this phase, turning education into a lucrative business proposition. The employment-oriented approach marginalized the significance of knowledgeseeking. The market-driven dynamics of admissions and placement success became the primary criteria for evaluating institutions. This trend was especially pronounced in non-social science and management disciplines. In this evolving landscape, the employability crisis for social science graduates became evident. The 'Latur Pattern' and 'Kota Pattern,' where in students prioritized coaching classes over regular institutions, underscored the challenges faced by social science graduates in securing employment. The splintering of social sciences into sub-disciplines, following the trend in other subjects, further diluted the knowledge content in teaching and learning.

FENCING THE COMMONS

The proliferation of social science subjects in the Indian education system, totaling close to 250, has resulted in disciplines that often lack relevance to the core discipline. This fragmentation, stemming from the adoption of Western teaching methods, has led to the creation of boundaries around disciplines, effectively fencing the commons from within. Historical Indian social sciences, rooted in monolithic knowledge, were often inaccessible before the internet era, prompting reliance on Western sources for teaching and learning. In prestigious institutions like the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, rich libraries hold vintage social sciences documents highlighting the interconnected nature of the discipline. However, post-independence commissions and national education policies have largely overlooked the inter-dependencies of social sciences in teaching and learning. Reports focused on infrastructure, curriculum, and teacher training, neglecting the essential aspects of learning methodologies. Professor Yash Pal's insight emphasizes the unintended consequence of imprisoning disciplinary studies within opaque walls, hindering creativity and limiting imagination.

STUCK IN SCHOOL PEDAGOGY

The teaching and learning processes in social sciences have been largely neglected by education policymakers. The first generation of social scientists, trained outside India, brought with them knowledge, curriculums, and methods that were strictly adhered to. The subsequent generations, including teachers and students, followed these routines meticulously, influenced by Western-trained social scientists. Pedagogical methods,

introduced by Herbart, emphasized steps like preparation, presentation, association, generalizations, and applications. However, in the context of teaching social sciences, these steps were mechanically followed without focusing on association or generalization.

TEACHER QUALITY AND ENHANCEMENT

Commissions and committees have aimed to enhance teacher quality and teaching materials, particularly in social sciences, through nationwide refresher courses and capacity-building programs. However, my experience with NAAC peer review teams has revealed minimal improvement in teaching quality or material changes, despite widespread initiatives. The computerization of materials, represented by PowerPoint presentations, has not significantly deepened knowledge-seeking behavior among faculty members, and the push for smart classrooms appears to prioritize technology over fostering smart applications in social sciences among students.

NEO-LIBERALISM AND POSITION OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

Early privatization in India, initially in medical sciences, later extended to engineering, management, and other disciplines, aimed to address inadequate public education funding. While philanthropic efforts initially contributed to educational quality, the motive shifted to commercialization with liberalization. Private educational institutions proliferated significantly, with a notable impact on engineering, medical, and management disciplines, leaving social sciences somewhat marginalized. Establishing a Centre for Social Sciences in Bangalore in a privately funded institution highlighted the focus on profit over knowledge enhancement.

KVG's journey is a celebration of human culture, resilience, and intellectual prowess. KVG Hailed from the quaint village of Byrapatna in the present Ramanagar district of Karnataka. He was born on 26 June 1923 to Krishnadase Gowda and Manchamma, who were farmers by occupation.

He completed his early schooling in the village before embarking on a transformative educational odyssey. His pursuit of knowledge led him to Bangalore, where he completed high school, and later to Maharaja's College in Mysore, where he earned a 1st Class Master's Degree in Economics in 1948. Despite all odds, KVG decided to pursue a doctoral degree at the prestigious London School of Economics. Overcoming challenges that showcased his intellectual prowess, KVG emerged with a doctoral degree, ready to contribute his insights to the academic landscape. Upon returning to India, the opportunities for such vast knowledge were unlimited. However, KVG found a significant platform at the University of Mysore, where he became a pivotal figure in reshaping the Department of Economics. His commitment to education remained unwavering, even in the face of numerous prestigious positions. Under his mentorship, the Central College of Bangalore transformed into Bangalore University, reflecting Gowda's influence in shaping the ethos of the institution.

KVG became the head of the Department of Economics and served for 16 long years. He brought many initiatives to improve the quality of teaching and learning. Due to his efforts, thousands of students from the economics department were placed in prestigious posts. He left an indelible mark in the history of the Economics department.

KVG's dedication extended beyond the academic realm. He wrote prolifically, producing articles, research papers, and monographs that showcased the depth of his intellectual engagement. His interactions with policymakers and unwavering fight against corruption underscored his conviction that corruption negatively impacted Indian economic growth, development, and exchange rates.

The accolades bestowed upon KVG are a testament to his exceptional contributions. From the Special Leverhulme Academic Award of the London School of Economics in 1953-54 to the Karnataka State Award for Economics in 1984, his name even found its place in the list of potential Nobel laureates for his book 'Perestroika and Glasnost for India.'



INTERVIEW WITH PROF. BISALIAH

About the Prof. Siddanaik Bisaliah

With a wealth of experience spanning over 50 years, Professor Siddhanaik Bislaiah is a distinguished economist known for his contributions to teaching, research, and development. Born in Madhur Village, Chamarajnagar District, he holds honours and master's degrees in Economics from the University of Mysore and a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Minnesota. Throughout his career, he has served in various academic positions, including Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, and Professor of



Economics at the University of Agriculture Sciences, Bangalore, and other prestigious institutions. Professor Bislaiah's expertise extends to international consulting for organizations such as the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation, the Asian Development Bank, and the World Bank.

Students of Department of Economics (SDE): Could you share your journey into economics and what ignited your interest in this field? Prof. S Bisaliah (PSB): I began my academic journey at Mysore University in 1955, where I faced a significant language barrier due to my background in Kannada-medium schooling. To pursue higher education, I had to switch to an English-medium college, which was challenging. However, I persevered and excelled, eventually becoming the top-ranked student in my PUC. Following a conversation with my teacher, Prof. Sadhasivayya, who recognized my aptitude for logic, I decided to major in economics. My undergraduate years were competitive, as I was among several talented students. My belief in hard work as a substitute for intelligence paid off, and I graduated with honors. I proceeded to complete my master's degree, held various roles such as a research fellow, and eventually became an assistant professor of economics at the University of Agriculture Sciences, Bengaluru. It was during this time that I received an opportunity to pursue a Ph.D. in the United States at the University of Minnesota. Despite the challenges of adapting to the mathematical language of economics, I persevered and completed my doctorate. My career path led me to serve as an associate professor, a registrar, and eventually, the vice-chancellor of the University of Agriculture Sciences, Bengaluru, a historic achievement for an economist. Later, I also held positions in various fields, such as Chairman of the Agriculture Pricing Commission, Chairperson of BMS College of Engineering, and academic head of Ambedkar School of Economics.

SDE: How do you foresee the future of the primary sector in India?

PSB: The primary sector, agriculture, witnessed significant growth during the Green Revolution. Before this, India was classified as a third-category country, unable to achieve food security even with external assistance. The implementation of the Green Revolution, which utilized science and technology to enhance food security, brought about positive changes. However, the Green Revolution also had its downsides, such as soil degradation and excessive water use. The solutions to these challenges will be crucial for the future of Indian agriculture.

SDE: Do you have any predictions for the future of the Indian economy?

PSB: I believe that substantial GDP growth depends on increased savings and investments. Currently, I do not foresee a rapid expansion of the Indian economy. But the future may be bright!

SDE: What advice would you give to aspiring economists or students of economics?

PSB: My advice to budding economists is to study diligently, read extensively, and not solely depend on their teachers. It's crucial to engage with original texts in economics to develop a deep understanding of the subject.

SDE: What are your thoughts on government freebies during elections?

PSB: Government-provided freebies, such as ration distribution and women's empowerment programs, serve important welfare purposes. However, some schemes, like "Gruha Lakshmi," should be targeted toward those in greater need. I also believe that unemployment stipends for graduates should have a limited duration of less than two years. While such initiatives may create some fiscal burden for the government, careful balancing can ensure their sustainability.

SDE: What are the strengths and weaknesses of the Indian economy?

PSB: The strengths of the Indian economy stem from its rich heritage and abundant natural and economic resources. However, weaknesses emerge from the overexploitation of these resources, hindering overall development. Historically, India faced challenging economic periods marked by excessive regulations and import substitution policies from 1948 to 1991, resulting in a sluggish growth rate (3.5%). The pivotal moment arrived in 1991 when Dr. Manmohan Singh led economic reforms, initiating liberalization, privatization, and globalization. These reforms revitalized the economy, eventually achieving an 8% growth rate. Despite India's historical knowledge and resources, challenges persist due to outdated practices and an over-reliance on past strategies.

SDE: If not an economist, what profession would you have chosen?

PSB: While I received requests to enter politics and pursue civil service, my true passion always lay in teaching and research.

SDE: What are your hobbies or how do you spend your free time?

PSB: In my leisure time, I enjoy reading books, that I couldn't read during my busy career.

SDE: Could you share a book that had a significant impact on you?

PSB: "Great Expectations" and "Hard Times" by Charles Dickens have had a profound influence on me.

SDE: What is your favourite economics concept or theory?

PSB: I have a deep appreciation for the Duality Theorem in macroeconomics.

AJAY BANGA SELECTED AS 14TH PRESIDENT OF THE WORLD BANK

- The Executive Directors of the World Bank selected Ajay Banga as President of the World Bank for a five-year term beginning June 2, 2023.
- Ajay Banga is the first-ever Indian-American and Sikh-American to head either of the two top international financial institutions: the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.
- Banga received Padma Shri award in 2016, India's third highest civilian award.

INDIA GETS RANK 38 IN WORLD BANK'S LOGISTIC PERFORMANCE INDEX (LPI) 2023

- According to World Bank's Logistic Performance Index (LPI) 2023, India is now ranked 38th in the 139 countries index.
- India's performance has drastically improved from 2014 when it was ranked 54th on the LPI.
- Logistics Performance Index (LPI) is a tool created to help countries identify the challenges and opportunities they face in their performance on trade logistics and what they can do to improve their performance.
- LPI analyzes the countries through their efficiency, competency, quality and ability of the logistics services provided in the county.
- The International LPI 2023 allows for comparisons across 139 countries.
- This year's Top Performers are Singapore and Finland.

FOREIGN TRADE POLICY 2023 LAUNCHED

- The Union Minister of Commerce and Industry, Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution and Textiles has Iaunched the Foreign Trade Policy 2023.
- The New policy has replaced the old policy that had been in place since 2015,
- The new policy starts from 2023-24 and aims to almost triple India's goods and services exports to \$2 trillion by 2030, from an estimated \$760 billion in 2022-23.
- The Old Policy enabled the growth of exports by 75% from \$435 billion in 2015-16 to \$760 billion in 2022-23.
- India's global share in merchandise exports and services exports is very low and the government aims to grow it to the range of 7% to 10%.

DE-DOLLARISATION OF TRADE BETWEEN INDIA AND MALAYSIA

- Recently, India and Malaysia have agreed to settle trade in the Indian rupees.
- De-Dollarisation is a process of substituting the US dollars with another currency to carry out international trade transactions.
- It is a method of reducing the dollar's dominance in the global markets.
- De-Dollarisation is undertaken by countries in-order to reduce their dependence on US Dollar, Improve Economic stability, Reduce the influence of Monetary Policy of US and to increase their trade and investment.

MINIRATNA STATUS ACCORDED TO SECI

- Solar Energy Corporation of India Limited (SECI) has been accorded the status of Miniratna Category-I Central PublicSector Enterprise (CPSE)
- Established in 2011, It is the primary implementing agency of the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy for Renewable Energy schemes/projects towards fulfillment of India's International commitments.
- It has contributed towards the nation's climate commitments, carbon emission reduction strategies and sustainable energy transition.
- The Miniratna schemewas initiated in the year 1997.
- Miniratna Category-I status: The CPSEs which have made a profit in the last three years continuously, pre-tax profit is Rs.30 crores or more in at least one of the three years and have a positive net worth, are eligible to be considered for grant of Miniratna-I status.
- Miniratna Category-II status: The CPSEs whichhave made profit for the last three years continuously and have a positive net worth are eligible to be considered for grant of Miniratna-II status.
- The Government of India has provided more autonomy and delegation of financial powers to the Miniratna enterprises to make them efficient and competitive.

CCEA NODS TO RAISE MSP FOR ALL MANDATED KHARIF CROPS FOR 2023-24.

 The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs has approved the increase in Minimum Support Prices for all mandated Kharif Crops for 2023-24.

RBI CONCEPTUALISES LIGHT-WEIGHT PAYMENT SYSTEM

- The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has conceptualized a lightweight payment and settlements system, which it is calling a "bunker" equivalent of digital payments.
- It can be operated from anywhere by a bare minimum staff in exigencies such as natural calamities or war.
- The infrastructure for this system will be independent of the technologies that underlie the existing systems of payments such as UPI, NEFT, and RTGS.
- The central bank has not offered a timeline for the launch of this payments system yet.
- The existing conventional payments systems such as RTGS, NEFT, and UPI use advanced and complex IT infrastructure.
- The lightweight and portable payment system is expected to operate on minimalistic hardware and software, and would be made active only on a "need basis".
- Such a lightweight and portable payment system could ensure near zero downtime and uninterrupted functioning of essential payment services
- The system is expected to process transactions that are critical to ensure the stability of the economy, including government and market related transactions.

IRDAI ISSUES DRAFT GUIDELINES FOR BIMA VAHAKS

- The Insurance Regulatory and Development Authority of India issued draft guidelines for Bima Vahaks
- Bima Vahaks is a women- centric workforce in each Gram Sabha that will meet the women heads of each household to convince them about a composite insurance product like Bima Vistar.
